MILTONIANA.—*Notes on Milton Church and Parish*, by Rev. J. E. Kelsall and A. Paris (Cox and Sharland, Southampton, 1/-).

These "Notes" consist of extracts from Registers, Rate Books, and other sources of historical information relating to Milton, the pretty little village which lies on the coast of Hampshire, midway between Lymington and Christchurch. Although the notes are grouped into seven sections, yet they are unconcatenated and uninterpreted, so that they form merely the raw material of History, and not in any sense History itself. If Milton should find its historian they will prove useful.
